

Sadly, we have had to say goodbye to three more of our Citizens on Patrol members. Dave Grattan, Bob Finch and Peter Cherbak were all members of the SAH Association, Citizens on Patrol (COP) and were wonderful community residents.

DAVE GRATTAN – 8-18-28 / 2020

Dave served in the U.S. Navy. Dave and his wife, Evelyn (who passed away several years prior), had five children and moved to San Antonio Heights where they purchased their home on Highland Road in the early 90's. Dave owned Dave Grattan & Sons Tool Company (now known as Grattan Fastening Products Company). Dave's son, Jack, and daughter, Chris, ran the Company after Dave retired. Company has now been sold but Randy, his grandson, still works there. Dave also had a side business that he enjoyed tinkering around with and he was the builder of the Hound Dog and Hot Dog minibikes.



ROBERT C. FINCH - 1-30-30 / 10-9-20



Robert (Bob) Finch passed away on October 9, 2020, at age 90. After high school he joined the U.S. Air Force where he served as a pilot and after nine years of service he was honorably discharged. Bob then studied psychology and began his career as a clinical psychologist for the State of California. Bob also ventured into other positions with the State which included serving as a parole agent, polygraph examiner, and IRS Union President.

Bob and his wife, Dolores, have lived many years in the Heights. Bob was an early member of the San Antonio Heights Association and served as the first appointed editor of the San Antonio Heights Gazette Newsletter in 1995. Records indicate the Gazette was created originally by the SAHA Board of Directors. Bob moved on from his duties with the Association to serve on the Citizens on Patrol where he served as an active member for many years.

As far back as I can remember Bob and Dolores were the friendly official greeters and ticket takers for the Citizens on Patrol Annual Community Breakfast. Bob & Dolores hosted many COP group events at the Dodger Stadium as they had access to the VIP Clubhouse.



PETER CHERBAK - 9-9-29 / 3-29-21




Peter Cherbak was one of the original members of Citizens on Patrol when it was started in 1995 and served as a Director of the San Antonio Heights Association Board. Peter was almost always involved in the projects supported by SAHA. Particularly, I recall how he spent hours volunteering and collecting signatures for the LAFCO lawsuit in 2019. Although we were

unable to obtain an actual obituary on Bob or Dave, the following obituary was published in the Daily Bulletin written by Peter's two children, and I think you will find it interesting:

Our Dad died after the pruning was finished and the blossoms had just begun to appear. What a full life he led. His roots are deep in Upland. He was born in an old rock house in a Lemon Grove, just in time for the great depression. As the depression eased and hope sprung, he saw his first airplane up close, a fabric covered biplane, and he was hooked. On that day, a future pilot sprouted out of that ever-curious little farmer boy. He did every job under the sun to make that dream a reality, eventually ending up building hangers at Cable Airport just to get flight time. Getting his driver's license and pilot's license at the same time posed the problem of only being able to afford a car or an airplane. He and his closet two friends, of course figured out how to buy a dismantled AT-6 airplane, left for dead in parts under a tree. After putting it back together and in flightworthy condition, all he could afford was a motorcycle. Just flying was not enough airplane for the young sapling, so he became an airplane mechanic, then on to flying in the Navy and then for American Airlines. One night while flying to Chicago, he almost achieved immortality by being the first person to ever see a new comet. Never being the type of man to seek notoriety, it was only after his friends dared him that he reported it to Mt. Wilson Observatory. However, two days of overcast skies delayed the confirmation, and a Czech man reported it, and took the glory of having it named after him. Some might feel jilted, but not our Dad. He just laughed it off and got back to the important things. After his retirement is when his

second lifetime began. He branched out into so many new directions volunteering with the Claremont Botanical Gardens and so many other things, it would fit volumes. He never stopped living, and learning, and doing and being a great friend to so many.

His wisdom lives on in so many he knew well, and even in many that were only briefly blessed by the shade of the mighty tree he grew to be. Pete may be gone from this earth, but he lives on in the seeds he has sown, as a truly irreplaceable man. To sum him up; he was an opera loving farmer airline pilot, who could learn and teach anything interesting to him, while fixing your clock and your car, build a house (or two) and a plane (or three) and be the best father two kids could ever hope for. He will always be our North Star. A funeral mass will be celebrated at St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Upland on Friday, June 11th, 10 a.m.

ZOLL “AUTO-PULSE” UNITS DEPLOYED in San Antonio Heights & Upland Fire Stations aiming to increase cardiac arrest survival rates



On February 9, 2021, Battalion Chief Mike McClintock, Public Information Officer with San Bernardino County Fire Department (SBCOFD) deployed multiple Zoll “Auto-Pulse” Units in San Antonio Heights and Upland, aiming to increase cardiac arrest survival rates. SBCOFD has deployed four Auto-pulse units, ensuring an auto-pulse is on ALL cardiac arrest calls.

ZOLL “AUTO-PULSE” UNITS Continued

Zoll Auto-Pulse Equipped Units: Station 161 (475 N 2nd Ave) - ME161 • Station 163 (1350 N Benson) - ME163 • Station 164 (1825 N Campus) ME164 • Station 12 (2413 N. Euclid) ME12

With the addition of these four units, nearly all of Division 1 stations have an Auto-Pulse. Division 1 covers the City of Fontana, City of Upland, San Antonio Heights and Bloomington. Personnel have been trained on Auto-Pulse use and the units have been placed into service on the Medic Engines.

The ZOLL® Auto-Pulse® Resuscitation System delivers high-quality circumferential chest compressions without interruption. Featuring a unique stabilizing board, the Auto-Pulse ensures that patients receive nonstop care without comprising CPR quality.

Crews have been trained by SBCOFD Nurse Educators & Zoll staff on use & integration with Zoll cardiac monitors. Multiple SBCOFD transporting units have been using this system with the goal of countywide coverage in the years to come.



NEIGHBORS HELPING A NEIGHBOR

A woman named Eileen comes to mind who lives on the East side of the Heights. In March we learned from a resident, about Pest, a shepherd dog, who had been most likely attacked by a mountain lion and in need of some serious medical care. When Eileen found out, she and her dog, Little Bear, went immediately to see if she could help. Eileen soon had the resident's confidence to let her call a vet to come out and examine Pest. The veterinarian shaved most of Pest's back, cleaned the infected wound, and told Eileen and the resident, that she felt it was done by a mountain lion. Eileen also sent a picture to her neighbor, Eric Dugan, who is a wildlife expert, and he said the wound was from a big cat and even indicated which wounds were from teeth, claws, etc. Since Pest had lots of raw skin and several puncture wounds that needed daily cleaning and medicine to begin healing, Eileen was permitted to take Pest to her house to continue the treatment more conveniently as the antibiotic cream had to be applied twice a day regularly. At Eileen's house it was also fun to watch Pest and Little Bear talk through the window. Eileen said she knew it was difficult because she knew how much Pest was loved and missed by its owner and Mokus, the other shepherd. The neighbors knew Pest was in good hands and visitors often stopped by to check on him. Pest is also popular with those who walk or bike nearby his home.

Great News! Pest continued to heal well, and several neighbors got together and rebuilt/reinforced Pest' kennel. They also put some pavers down on part of the flooring as well as some pet friendly Astroturf which Mokus (the female shepherd) loved! Reroofed the doghouse and added some carpet inside to make it more comfortable. They added a strong tarp over part of the kennel for rain shelter and shade. It was great to see so many neighbors and family come to help these dogs and it was a great opportunity to connect with neighbors as a community. We all had fun doing this project - so how about that? Pest had Little Bear to play with in the meanwhile and they became close, but Eileen knew it would make Pest happy to be home. Eileen's family will miss Pest's funny, endearing ways but knows she can see him daily, so it is a win win! Pest's recovery was a miracle, he healed very well and is a super sweet dog.

Eileen felt the real miracle to this story was that a neighbor brought attention to Pest's injuries and that so many neighbors stopped by to see Pest while he was healing and the best of all was that so many volunteered their time to help reinforce the kennel and

make it safe for the pups. Everyone bonded and it was awesome to see the community spirit alive and well in the Heights. She smiled and said, “It gave us warm fuzzies”. Pest has been home for a while, and they do see him almost daily. He is doing great and he and Mokus love running along the fence with Little Bear. The resident is so grateful to everyone who helped with the kennel – neighbors, Terry and Rosalie S., Josh and Sheri R., Chrissy G., Frank H., and the resident’s family (daughter, granddaughter, and grandson).

WILDLIFE SIGHTINGS

Mountain lion, bobcat and bear sightings has been brought to our attention by several residents having either seen them physically or by security cameras. It would seem these wildlife animals (who lived here first) are looking for food, so you may want to take extra special care with the safety for your pets. RATTLESNAKE SEASON IS HERE FOR SURE

The season started early this year so our advice to everyone is to ***ALWAYS KEEP YOUR EYES WIDE OPEN NO MATTER WHERE YOU ARE.*** There is a local wildlife expert, Eric Dugan, who lives in the Heights, and he is always happy to help with rattlesnakes. He relocates them. He does work for Edison and other companies on natural habitats for California native wildlife so if you need him, he is always ready to assist the neighborhood. You can leave a message with SAHBulletinBoard@gmail.com and someone will get back to you.



It is recommended that residents quit taking their pets to the hills during snake season and consider getting the rattlesnake shot for your dogs to help buy time if they are bitten. It is also recommended that you check with your veterinarian to see if they keep the anti-venom available in the event you or your pet needs it. Several small rattlesnakes have been reported so far this year. Dianna Lee, our Representative from the Supervisor Rutherford’s office, posted a picture of a

rattlesnake next to the water hose in her front yard. She lives directly across from us in Rancho. Be Careful and Be safe!

****TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS:** In this issue, the Fire Department Stats report there were no accidents in the last six months of 2019, but six accidents were reported same period in 2020. This could be a result of speeding, not stopping at stop signs – just a reminder to everyone to slow down and obey the traffic laws.
