

Report from Battalion Chief Jason Serrano



For your fire news... with Spring just around the corner, now would be a good time to remind everyone to start thinking about changing their smoke detector batteries if they are not hardwired. I also noticed a little spike in the amount of vehicle accidents, so maybe a reminder to navigate cautiously through uncontrolled intersections in the community to reduce some of the risk would be a good one too.

The fire station was in need of a new roof, mostly due to aging, but it also sustained some damage during the recent wind event. You may see that work being performed as soon as we finish the competitive bid process. During and after the windstorm, our Hand Crews and saw teams from the Fire Camp cleared out nearly 100 downed trees in the roadways throughout Upland and San Antonio Heights. Hopefully you fared well through that storm.

To answer your question about the staffing – yes. Unfortunately, due to COVID, we have had some days when crew members became sick, and we had to reduce the crew down to 2 people and staffed the brush patrol. Like many other agencies in our region, at the height of the surge in positive infections, we did have a couple of days when we simply could not staff the engine due to the number of people out. Fortunately, cases all around the County have been dropping and we are in much better shape with our staffing again.

I am looking forward to meeting with you all in-person again. It has been too long. If you have any questions, please feel free to

give Battalion Chief Serrano a call. Also, I am sure BC Serrano will either be at the Annual Meeting November 15th or will send a representative if he is not on duty.

In this issue, we would like to share information that you may or may not know, especially those of you who have recently made your home in San Antonio Heights. We welcome you and hope you will become involved in the community and the San Antonio Heights Association (SAHA), which manages the publishing of this article and this Gazette Newsletter. The Association has been instrumental in conducting and working on areas of improvement under its leadership and support. Several methods of communications have been created over the years with the goal of being able to connect with all residents. Listed below are the forms of communication provided to and from you! GAZETTE NEWSLETTER - The Association published its first Gazette Newsletter in 1991, and currently we distribute copies (by bulk mail) to every address in San Antonio Heights. In 1991, the newsletters were published usually twice a year. In 2000, we published four issues but have recently dropped back to twice a year. The Gazette Newsletter includes articles on membership, future events, announcements, articles of interest and more. We are always looking for residents who might be interested in working on the newsletter. (Please note fewer issues were published during the Covid pandemic)

SAHA EMAIL NOTICES - (optional and one must "request" to be added to the list) - Recently, during preparations for the Santa event, we learned that many residents were unfamiliar with our Email Distribution Notices. This is our only quick source of communicating with the residents for invitations, alerts, or other issues. We would like to have EVERY resident with a computer, an email address, or interested in getting current information regarding events, alerts, etc., to contact Katie Hawthorne at SAHBulletinBoard@gmail.com and give her your email address, name, street address, phone number and she will add you to the list. We understand that every resident does not necessarily have computer service or an email. If you do not correspond by email, let us know, and notices needing immediate attention, we can copy and send to you by regular mail. If you have concerns of sharing your email, residence address, and/or phone number - we assure you, NO ONE will have access to this information except the Communications Administrator and this information is NEVER shared with anyone. Katie is extremely confident and trustworthy. I suggest you sign up to receive these emails. We probably send

out about 10-20 emails a year which only contain primarily information regarding events, alerts or important messages from this and the extended communities,

The website is primarily for residents to learn about the functions of the Association such as: SAHA monthly Board meetings (when there is no covid), copies of past Gazette Newsletters, the Star, Membership, photos of events such as the breakfast and steakfest, produce exchange, Citizens on Patrol, etc. Take time to go to this website and check it out.

We make every attempt to follow up on these messages to confirm they have been received and managed.

Companies also post on this site that you may find interesting. Create an account or log in to Instagram.

<u>BANNERS</u> – Annual meetings and all scheduled SAHA sponsored community events are posted in front of SBCounty Fire Station #12 at Euclid Ave. & 24th St., Campus Ave. & 24th St., San Antonio Avenue at the "Y" slightly above 24th St., and Mountain Ave. before 24th opposite side of San Antonio Park.

YOU CAN "HELP" YOUR "CITIZENS ON PATROL" WE NEED VOLUNTEERS

The "Citizens on Patrol" (COP) was organized in 1995 when neighbors of San Antonio Heights/Mt Baldy found a need to assist the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. At that time the COP had 17 members and grew to over 30 active members.

Due to the "Coronavirus" in the past couple of years and the loss of COP members with medical problems and deaths, the membership has hit an all-time low of nine members.

What is the COP? The COP are the eyes and ears for the Sheriff's Deputies to deter criminal active within San Antonio Heights/Mt Baldy. They perform many community services such as vacation and welfare checks; traffic control for accidents; etc. COP members patrol in a marked vehicle to show an added presence for law enforcement.

A **Volunteer** needs only to fill out an application and/or come to a COP meeting (the last Tuesday of each month at 6:30 (1830 hours) at the Sheriff's Substation in back of Giuseppe's Restaurant at 2433 North Euclid Avenue, Upland, CA After being trained you may patrol at times of your choosing. It is suggested that at least you are able to give 8 hours a month.

The Association had learned of several discussions among neighbors of recent thefts in the Heights and reached out to discuss these concerns with Dianna Lee, Administrative Assistant to Supervisor Janice Rutherford. Since we would be inviting Sheriff Shannon Dicus to our SAHA Annual Meeting, Dianna suggested we invite Captain Brian Zeigler to attend our July meeting and talk to us about crime in the Heights and would be a good tie to request the crime activity numbers to publish in the SAH Gazette Newsletter as we had done previously. Captain Zeigler did attend our July meeting along with Deputy Chris Henry who is assigned to the Heights. Captain Zeigler began by sharing the above report.

Captain Ziegler presented the above report and reviewed some recommended crime prevention tips (next page). He recommends using a compression stick on French Doors as it appears to be a favorite entry point. Mail theft continues to be a problem. Take pictures of the inside of your home, write down any serial numbers, keep a list of valuable items and notify Citizens on Patrol (COP) and neighbors when you are away from home. Dianna Lee added that 100% of any pictures taken of your belongings can be used by insurance companies.

SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FONTANA STATION "CRIME PREVENTION TIPS"

- Always lock the doors and windows to your home and vehicle
- Pick up your mail and newspapers each day
- Do not leave valuables in plain view in your vehicle
- Make a list of the serial numbers for your electronic items, firearms, and bicycles. Serial numbers and values can be helpful.
- If you go on vacation or away from your home, tell a trusted neighbor so they can keep an eye on your house for you and collect your mail. You can also notify COP at 909.920.0204.
- Be a good neighbor and watch out for each other
- If you own a safe in your home, bolt it to the floor or wall to secure it and keep it locked when not in use
- Take photographs of your jewelry and keep them in a safe place
- Consider installing and maintaining security cameras capable of saving the recordings
- Consider installing motion lighting to cover your driveway and property
- Consider installing extra security devices on your doors, sliding glass doors and windows. A wooden dowel or PVC pipe will work on the windows and slider. Install longer screws on the door locks and housing to better secure them to the door frame
- Lock your side gate(s) leading into your back yard
- Be cautious of people you don't know knocking on your door. Many thieves will use a
 decoy to knock on the door to see if anyone is home. If you answer, they may pretend
 they are looking for a fictitious person
- Always be aware of your surroundings and if you see something that does not look right, call your local law enforcement – For non-emergency business hours 909.356.6767 or non-emergency Dispatch 909.829.7311
- Take note of the description of the person and/or vehicle and attempt to obtain a license plate number. If you can, take pictures or video of them so you can provide it to law enforcement
- Trim heavy vegetation from around your front doors and windows. Thieves will often use these areas to hide from street view and may take the opportunity to break in.

YOUR ADDRESS?

CAN YOU AND OTHERS SEE YOUR ADDRESS FROM THE STREET?

In preparation for our Santa Event on December 19th, it was the Association's responsibility to map out the route for Santa. After putting the addresses in order of the 51 families who had responded, I drove the prepared route and one concern was "FINDING ADDRESS NUMBERS" quickly and in a few cases the numbers were not posted at all.

In consideration of an emergency, we suggest that you read this article and take the time to make sure your "address numbers" are clearly visible for not only emergency responses but your friends, family, workers, etc. Put yourself in the position of a driver of an emergency vehicle that might be responding to your home. Remember in the Heights,

1) Most of us do not have curbs to show our address numbers and we might need to get creative.

- 2) Emergency vehicles can come from both directions. An address posted with the number on both sides would be perfect. This is a very inexpensive way to go it is reflective, address on both sides, about three feet from the street, and can be seen by a responder coming from both directions.
- 3) If your access entrance is behind another house, an arrow pointing to that location would be awesome. I recall seeing a house with the address on the entrance driveway gate between two houses. This situation might require alerting the responder to actually look for the gate. I missed it the first time because no one told me, but Santa had no problem

with these specific instructions because we were looking for it,



4) Dark areas at night without lights - a reflective and /or a "lighted by electric" or "solar sign" might be a consideration.

This is a great example – it was positioned perfect to read immediately and with the lighted sign it would definitely get a responder's attention. It was very attractive and fit well with their landscape.

I love how this resident included their address with the design of their home. You can't miss these numbers. It feels good also to see our flag located next to their address and of course the garden of beautiful flowers frame the address. very nicely. I heard there is also a motion light that shows the address.

https://wp.sbcounty.gov/ezop/conditions/residential-addressing/

The street address shall be installed on the building with numbers that are a minimum of four (4) inches in height and with a one-half inch (1/2) stroke.

The address shall be visible from the street

During the hours of darkness, the numbers shall be internally and electrically illuminated with a low voltage power source.

Numbers shall contrast with their background and be legible from the street.

Where the building is fifty (50) feet or more from the roadway, additional contrasting four (4) inch numbers shall be displayed at the property access entrances.

"BEARS IN THE HOOD"

We've lived in the Heights for 28 years and had regular bear visitors for the past twenty years. Nineteen years ago, one became a particular problem, ending up in one of the homes and causing significant damage. We interacted with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife at that time. We have a new bear visitor this year who is becoming very comfortable in the neighborhood.

Fish & Wildlife will tell you that you should not permit a bear to become comfortable. They recommend that you keep an air horn and blow the air horn when you see the bear. The noise bothers the bear and sends a message that the bear is not welcome. It is those bears which become welcome which end up being put down. So, making the bear uncomfortable benefits both you, your neighbors, and the bears. They also recommend that you report incidents when you see bears. They gave me the site at which to do so. It is easy to do. Go to www.wildlife.ca.gov. You will see a tab at the top which says 'Learning'. Click on that tab and you will see another link which reads 'Living with wildlife'. When you click on that, you will see a link for reporting an incident. If you report the sighting, they will collect the data and will usually call you for more information. They keep the data to track wildlife that might become a threat. If you don't report, they don't know. And when they don't know, it increases the chances that your neighbors may become victims of a bear incident.

We are aware of the residents' concerns with the numerous bear sightings this past year. I read this article that was on the Next-Door site, contacted the Thayer's for their permission for printing.
