“SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING”

During my preparation for this issue of the Gazette, Sharron Jungman (a resident of the Heights and a member of the COP) called and asked me to include the above slogan in the next Gazette.

This slogan brought back the memory of a phone call I received about a year ago on our San Antonio Heights Association message line. A woman on her way home from her morning hike and who lives in the Heights called on our Heights message phone. She immediately told me she had just noticed an incident that looked like a robbery may have just happened on the east side of the Heights, she was calling from her car and just happened to have our phone number. She described the car but said she could not get the license plate, because the car was in back of her and she was uncomfortable that the individuals might see her and be suspicious if she looked back. I asked her if she would be okay to stay on the line and told her I would call and ask the COP Commander for his suggestion on what to do. He told us she should call Dispatch and we learned he had just minutes prior been in contact with Chris, our Sheriff, who works this area, so in this case, the Commander talked with the woman and put her in contact with the Sheriff. Later that day I learned that the Sheriff was nearby, had responded and made an arrest. I was surprised how that made me feel good to have been available to help.

I do not know any other particulars about this event, other than her phone call did matter, my phone call did matter, the Commander's phone call did matter and a crime was either prevented or interrupted and someone was arrested. The message remains the same:

“DON'T HESITATE IF YOU “SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING”

Call Dispatch! Your call might help someone in some serious trouble or prevent a crime right here in the Heights or anywhere.

I asked Lloyd if he would be interested in authoring an article for the Gazette and telling us about how he came to be involved with the SBCounty Symphony. He said yes and while reading his well prepared article for the newsletter I was amazed at what a wonderful, adventurous, full, and exciting life he has had. Please enjoy – in this community everyone is our neighbor.

COMING TO THE "HEIGHTS"

THE EARLY YEARS - In 1987, Marion and I sold our two-story townhouse in Covina. We moved into our newly constructed Lewis Home in San Antonio Heights... Our home interior was constructed according to Marion's wishes. The exterior grounds looked like a moon scape, full of rocks and gravel. Nine double truckloads of topsoil were brought in to allow a future lawn and garden. Marion worked at Cal. State Los Angeles University (CSLA) as the Chief Chemistry Department Administrator for undergraduate and graduate school studies. She also helped write grant proposals for post-doctoral faculty research. She did this for 27 years, retiring in 1989.

I worked in a polymer R&D chemical laboratory. At Bell and Howell, I worked on Organo metallic magnetic polymers. This led to a patent and publication in various technical journals.

The events that led to Marion and I meeting were quite unique. At CSLA, I was working on an advanced degree in Political Economics and technology transfer to less developed countries. Further, both of us were members of ski racing teams competing on the US intermountain circuit. With these two occurrences in play, we linked up with each other, and tying the knot together, in 1979.

THE LATER YEARS - Aside from my 12 years in chemical R&D, my most interesting post graduate school employment was at Hampshire Chemical Company. There, I was tasked with sales and marketing of specialty chemical intermediates. At that time, Hampshire Chemical Company was the organic division of W.R. Grace. While I was there through time, Hampshire was bought and sold 4 times; eventually being absorbed into Dow Chemical.

At the time of Hampshire being first sold, I was also working in the evening, going for another advanced degree in international marketing at the Claremont Graduate School under the guidance of Peter Drucker.

In 1988, Hampshire tapped me to open new chemical intermediates markets in Southeast Asia, Latin America, Australia, and South Africa; cutting short my second graduate degree work at Claremont Graduate School.

In that time period from 1988 until 2001, Mr. Boeing and I became quite intermittent with each other, accumulating millions of flyer miles.

In that time period of 1989-2000, the internet was in its early years. Call reports and spell check hardly existed. As my penmanship and spelling was at question, my call reports were faxed to Marion in the "Heights" who typed them up and faxed them to Hampshire's Boston headquarters. In essence, Marion had come out of retirement to become a needed Hampshire Chemical contract employee.

After several years, it became more cost effective to have my own office and apartment in Hong Kong. Hong Kong became a locus of points of business travel. Travel took me into Shanghai, Wuhan, and Guangzhou. Taipei, Manila, Kuala Lumpur, Seoul, Hanoi, and Bangkok, as they were only a short distance away from my Hong Kong office. Perth, Mumbai, and Johannesburg were only an overnight away. In my market development role, my travel was largely devoted to the major industrial cities, and there in, I interfaced with their scientists, engineers, professional officials, societies, and government officials.

When Hampshire Chemical was bought out by Dow Chemical and absorbed into it, I returned to my home in San Antonio Heights, as Dow had its Pacific

Division headquarters in Hong Kong. After a year back in the States, along with most of the Hampshire management staff were spun off and let go. I was given a most generous severance package and a golden parachute. I left with no bitter feelings.

Hampshire Chemical was most generous to Marion and me. At Hampshire's expense, they flew her to my apartment in Hong Kong, and from there she was able to go with me to Jakarta, Taipei, Perth, and San Jose, Costa Rico.

RETIREMENT YEARS - After Marion retired from CSLA. she eventually found a calling to work on the staff of the Discovery Shop, which is part of the American Cancer Society's fund raising apparatus. I say calling, as Marion is a cancer survivor.

I, on the other hand, had a little more difficult time easing into retirement. Eventually, I discovered the Osher Lifelong Institute (OLLI) at Cal. State University at Fullerton where I have been a guest lecturer on China (PRC), its economy and its foreign policy with Russia, Europe, SE Asia, and the US. I also have given lectures on climate disruption (commonly known as climate change); its technology and its effects on the world economy.

One of the most interesting that I have been doing in retirement is connected with the San Bernardino Symphony Orchestra (SBS). The SBS is 95 years old. West of the Mississippi, only the Los Angeles and San Francisco Symphonies are older.

We are a regional Symphony. Our audience comes from San Bernardino County, eastern LA County, and Northern Orange County

Our Symphony has several homes: the California Theater for the Performing Arts in San Bernardino, for our full symphonic concerts and San Bernardino City College Theater for our jazz and chamber music concerts and its football stadium for our 4th of July concert and fireworks. Anthony Parnter is our Maestro and Music Director, whose multiyear contract has just been renewed.

In 2024 there are two remaining concerts: our "Movies with the Maestro" on October 26 and "Our Christmas Festival" on December 14th. Both concerts are at the San Bernardino Theater for the Performing Arts. You can access us on our website at: SanBernardinoSymphony.org.

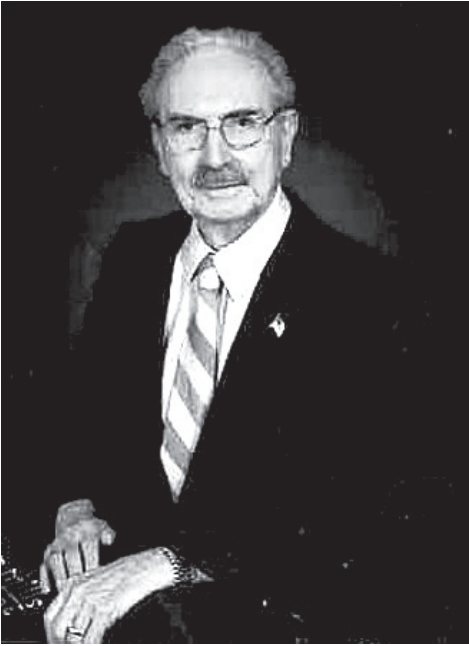

Obituary for Michael Pompa, 12-9-19 / 6-4-23



Received the following obituary from Laurent Pompa, one of the sons of Michael and Margaret Pompa, former residents of the San Antonio Heights from 1956 to 2023 (67 years). Michael passed away on June 4, 2023, and the family has recently begun the final and sad process of selling the family home, shuffling through photos and paperwork and gathering up memories with joy and tears.

Laurent began with how their parents had purchased the property at 2445 Oceanview Drive, Upland in December 1956 and completed construction of their new home the following year.

Michael and Margaret's contributions to the Heights included: both were founding members of the San Antonio Heights Association and served in administrative positions (secretary), founding members of the Heights Citizens Patrol, County Grand jury Services for five years, and served on the San Antonio Water Board.

The Pompa's five children were raised and educated participating in various academic competitions and athletic sports in Upland schools. Their children successfully continued their higher education at universities in and beyond the state of California and also received academic and athletic scholarships and finally settled into multiple professions in education, military, and business.

Earliest memories of living in the Heights included some vivid memories of the early Spring scent of orange and lemon blossoms, late night and early morning smoke from smug pots, the sound of aircraft-powered wind machines, and rows of orange and lemon groves cascading along San Antonio and Mountain Avenue with later coming the sounds of little league games, bear, deer, and coyote sightings cottontail rabbits feeding on our lawns, streets bordered by

Eucalyptus trees with no street lights; stopping by D & D Market for an occasional tank of gas and a soda (located in the general area of Guiseppe's Restaurant parking lot on EUCLID Ave), Santa Ana winds; protecting our home overnight by "hosing down", (with water hoses) on our wood shake roof against fire embers falling from the sky from forest fires roaring across the foothills of the San Gabriels, climbing all over the old stone "Power House", building on Mountain Ave., spending countless hours exploring the foothills above us (Cucamonga Canyon camping and fishing) and inside the San Antonio Dam, skateboarding down its spillway, "through Upland and Montclair; riding horses down the bridal path on Euclid Ave., shooting practice on East 24th St at the Rifle range and finally on some clear days seeing the Pacific Ocean. It will always be San Antonio Heights – the "jewel," of the San Gabriel to this family member. Oh, the stories and memories we can share
